### *INTEC Health Sciences Area Rotation Program*

This guidebook is directed to all the foreign students / residents that want to participate in a medical rotation of the Health Sciences Area of the Instituto Tecnológico de Santo Domingo (INTEC). Health Sciences Area and the Student Mobility Unit of INTEC manage this program.

We recommended reading this document, because inside you will find general information and guidelines that may be useful and have to be fulfilled by any foreign student that comes to visit INTEC and the Dominican Republic.

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## General Information

### Before coming

- *Student Visa*

If a foreign student wants to come to the Dominican Republic, they must have a Student Visa or Permit, in order to avoid any legal inconveniences. The student can apply for this kind of visa at a Dominican Republic Embassy. This will be requested after INTEC sends the admission letter for the exchange. For more information:

*Note: The admitted foreigner with this kind of visa will not be allowed to do any paid activity, however, in the time this doesn't limit the extension of the studies and in regulatory terms it if you determines can take a paid activities on a partial time or for an estimated duration (after requesting for this previously by the correct form).*

- *International Health Insurance*

The Foreign student must get an international medical insurance before coming to the institution. It is a requirement that every foreign student must fulfill as a precaution, to avoid any inconveniences. To get this insurance you must contact the insurance company of your preference and complete their requirements.

### Housing

There are several options for housing around the Gala area. INTEC does not offer housing, but we can help you find lodging. We tell the students to come with the idea of staying one or two days in a hotel and then look for a place of their liking. The cheapest hotels are near to the Colonial Zone.

### Work Hours

The clinical practice schedule is usually from 8am to 2pm from Monday to Friday, but this can vary according to the rotation. Depending on the rotation, shifts may be 12 to 24 hours, depending on the rotation group to which are assigned to. Your coordinator and classmates will provide the specific schedule and assignments during that rotation.

### Vaccinations

Students / residents must have their vaccinations up to date, primarily of the following: Tuberculosis, Hepatitis B and Tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis (Td/Tdap), Measles, mumps, rubella (MMR), and Varicella. Free vaccinations are offered at the Health Sciences Area and Primary Health Attention Unit Evangelina Rodríguez.

### Evaluation

The teachers of our faculty evaluate every student / residents at the end of each of the week. After completing, a certificate will be given to the entire student for their participation.

### **Where to report**

Before beginning the internship, a visit to the school campus must be made to meet the coordinator that will give you instructions for the week and a temporary ID. Also to fill any paperwork needed and make any additional payments needed.

### **Dress Code**

Students / residents must dress in a professional and clean manner. Shorts and baseball caps are not allowed during clinical practice hours. Scrubs can be used during the day, but street clothes can be worn as well. Comfortable and closed shoes are recommended. A white, long sleeve coat must be worn during clinical practice. ID must be worn at all times.

### **Currency**

The Dominican peso is the currency of the Dominican Republic. There are many money exchange service stands and banks from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm.

### **Documentation**

We recommend to always carrying with a valid ID or passport. The legal age for drinking is 18.

### **Electricity**

The electricity in the Dominican Republic operates at 110 Volts/60 Hertz. It is recommended to bring a transformer and / or surge protector if you bring electronic equipment with different voltage.

### **Time**

The local time zone is Eastern Caribbean Time (GMT -0400). The Dominican Republic does not change daylight savings time.

### **Weather**

The Dominican Republic enjoys warm tropical weather throughout the year. Depending on the area, on an average day may see full sun or a mixture of clouds and sun. Monthly average temperatures fluctuate between 25 ° and 30 ° C. The cooler season is from November to April and the warmest from May to October. We recommend to wear clothes proper to the weather.

## Instituto Tecnológico de Santo Domingo

### ● *History*

The Instituto Tecnológico de Santo Domingo is a private, non-profit university for public services. It was founded in 1972 by a young group of professionals who were committed to the dominican society and decided to offer their knowledge, academic vocation, and time to start this project. It started as an innovating university with the firm purpose of contributing to the country's social transformation, the continuing promotion of a better quality of life for its citizens, the preservation of its morals and material patrimony.

It began offering graduate programs, short courses through continued education, research activities and scientific divulgation. As of 1973, the university integrated to its curriculum the undergraduate programs. INTEC'S curriculum offers a lot of diversity: Engineering, Business, Health, Basic Sciences, Humanities and Social Studies. This diversity is also revealed in its specialties and graduate programs. There are three general directing bodies at INTEC:

- **Board of Regents:** It's the highest authority and the legal administrator of its patrimony. It is integrated by fifteen members, the Rector, graduates of INTEC and outstanding individuals of the national community.
- **Rectory:** It's the highest executive authority of INTEC, under the responsibility of the Rector.
- **Academic Council:** It's in charge of planning the academic policy in accordance with the instructions of the Board of Regents. Its members are the Rector, Vice-rectors (Academic, Administrative and of Research and Liaison) and the Directors of the different Study Areas (Faculties).

INTEC is located in the Gala neighborhood, west of the city of Santo Domingo, National District of the Dominican Republic.

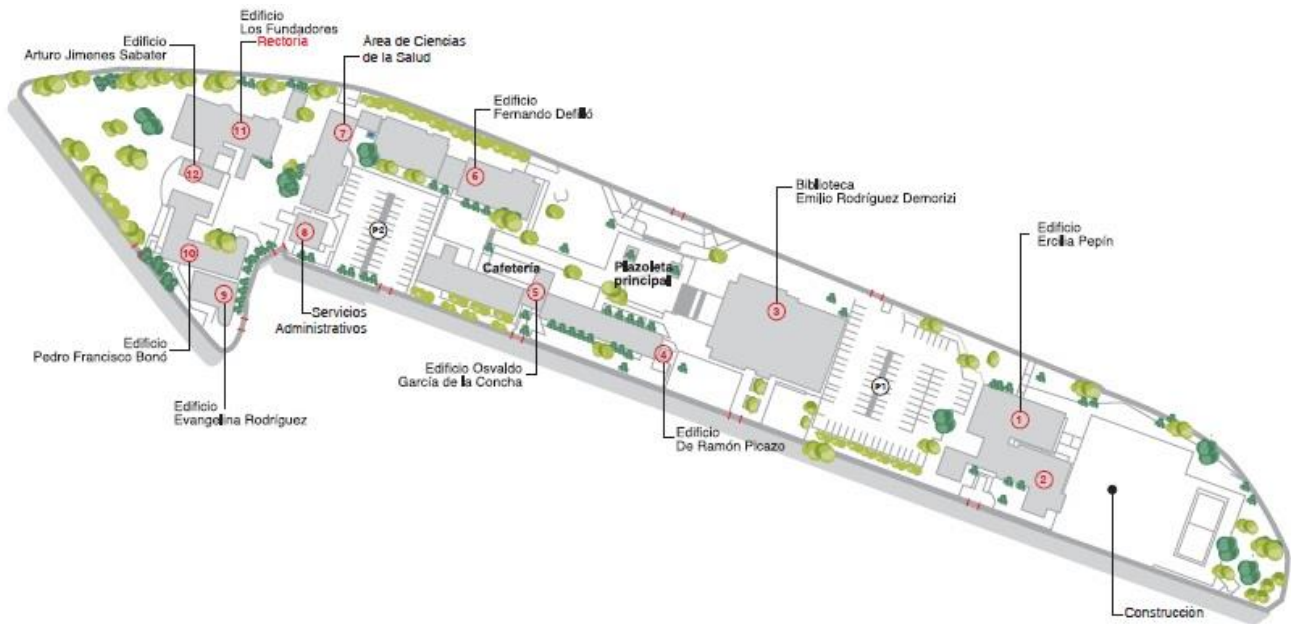

## Health Sciences Area

The Health Sciences Area of INTEC has the mission to form competent and efficient doctors, who are ethically responsible with the capacity to adapt to new technological advances oriented towards preventive medicine, but with the capacity to diagnose and solve the key problems in affecting primary attention.

The current study plan lasts 5 years, divided in 20 trimesters. Academic periods consist in 4 trimesters with 2 weeks of vacations in between. This system allows students to efficiently use their study time and guaranty the academic quality of the program.

Through medical clerkships, the student enriches their learning experience and acquires a more wide and integral formation in the field of medicine.

### ● *Research Projects within the Health Sciences Area*

Since the Instituto Tecnológico de Santo Domingo began offering its services in 1972, the Health Science Area was established. The medical career program was developed with the intention of forming a physician with knowledge on the major health problems affecting the country and a deep human motivation and social sensitivity to maintain a constant attitude of service. The career program proposed the formation of a professional who has the knowledge and skills necessary to practice their profession, and promoting the formation of a physician with expertise in the area of scientific research.

Benefits:

- Trains students in the methodology required to conduct scientific research paper.
- Encourages teamwork, both among students participating in the process.
- Enriches values such as solidarity, responsibility, initiative, independence, interest in things and time management.
- Helps to learn to manage different sources of information in the health area.
- Helps to learn to work efficiently under certain levels pressure.
- Promotes the safety and the loss of stage fright to have an efficient development at public events.
- Helps acquire a broad knowledge on a specific topic within the health area.

### ● *BioINTEC*

BioINTEC is the result of an active methodology that consists in carrying out a scientific research paper on health issues existing in our social environment, prepared by medical students during the two trimesters they are enrolled in Biology I and II courses. This process ends with the presentation of written report of their research subject and then a formal presentation at a public event. This event is raised and directed by the Areas of Health Sciences and BioINTEC Committee. BioINTEC is co-requisite of Biology I, Biology II and Methodology of Health Research courses. Research paper is conducted preferably in pairs, however, also be done individually and in groups of three or four, as the case warrants.

### ● *INTEC Program of Social Security (Programa INTEC de Seguridad Social – PROISS)*

As part of the Health Sciences Area and *Vice-rectory of Research and Liaison*, this program promotes research in the field of Social Security and Public Health. Research projects can be financed with funds from the institution, as well as national and international competitive and contracted funds.

## ● Clerkships

The following is a list of internship rotations we offer. The internship rotations in the medical school curriculum of INTEC are divided in five trimesters and each rotation has a specific period of time. The order of the list below is not the order of the internships; this depends on the specific internship available during that trimester. To apply for an internship rotation at INTEC, one must check if it is available at that time. The individual rotations within each specialty must be approved by the Coordinators of the area.

All of our rotations require a hands on approach from the students toward their patients. In all of our rotations, with the exception of the Social Medicine Clerkship, students must: Interact with all the medical staff, specially attending and residents, participating in bedside discussions, grand rounds, conferences and case presentations. Also, depending on the rotation, student shifts may be 12 to 24 hours.

### *Rotations Offered and Affiliated Hospitals*

#### Social Medicine Clerkship

Credits: 18

Location: Province Peravia

This unique clerkship marks the beginning of a yearlong rotation through different medical areas and Dominican hospitals. During the social medicine clerkship, the students enter a community based and preventive medicine rotation in the Province of Bani. This rotation has 2 parts:

- 1) Working in a Primary Health Attention Unit (in Spanish "Unidad de Atención Primaria or UNAP") based on a rural area giving supervised primary health care in these communities.
- 2) Living in this rural area, having student interact with the community's residents.

While living in the rural community during the rural part of this rotation, the students are evaluating the community's needs, finding sensible solutions for health problems and proposing a plan of action for disease prevention. They are also giving lectures and participating in educational campaigns about health promotion and disease prevention such as the prevention of sexually transmitted diseases and AIDS. In the urban setting they do the same activities.

In addition to their work on these communities, the students are also required to perform a scientific research paper on health issues existing in that social environment about a health related topic of interest and of their choosing. This process ends with the presentation of written report of their research subject and then a formal presentation at a public event.

#### Internal Medicine Clerkship

Credits: 13

Location: Hospital Dr. Salvador B. Gautier, Hospital General Plaza de la Salud and Centro de Diagnóstico y Medicina Avanzada y de Conferencias Médicas y Telemedicina (CEDIMAT)

This clerkship is divided in 3 different rotations, each lasting 4 weeks. This rotation includes 8 hour shift on weekdays and 12 hour shifts on weekends. Students rotate through different subspecialties in the Internal Medicine Department, in 3 different hospitals:

- Hospital Dr. Salvador B. Gautier: Endocrinology, Cardiology, Gastroenterology, and Emergency.
- Hospital Plaza de la Salud: Rheumatology, Emergency and Internal Medicine Department.
- Centro de Diagnóstico y Medicina Avanzada y de Conferencias Médicas y Telemedicina (CEDIMAT): Cardiology Department, which includes the cardiovascular ICU, cardiovascular surgery department and the interventional cardiology department.

### Surgery Clerkship

Credits: 3

Location: Hospital Dr. Salvador B. Gautier

These 12 weeks of surgical clerkship are divided in rotations through general surgery and different surgical areas. This active clerkship allows the student to interact and share patient discussions with almost all the surgical staff and residents in the hospital. This clerkship includes rotations through:

- Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery.
- Orthopedics.
- Ear, Nose and Throat.
- General Surgery
- Urology.

It's a rotation where organization, dedication and effort are an integral part of clerkship. Also, it's an opportunity for the student to have a hands on experience in the day to day hospital life, as part of a medical team. This rotation includes 8 hour shift on weekdays and 12 hour shifts on weekends.

### Pediatrics Clerkship

Credits: 10

Location: Hospital Infantil Dr. Robert Reid Cabral, Hospital General Dr. Marcelino Vélez Santana and Ciudad Sanitaria Hospital Dr. Luis E. Aybar

This clerkship is divided in 4 different rotations. Students rotate through different subspecialties in the Pediatrics Department, in 3 different hospitals:

- Hospital Infantil Dr. Robert Reid Cabral: Endocrinology, Inpatient Ward, Pneumology and Emergency.
- Hospital General Dr. Marcelino Vélez Santana: Inpatient Ward, Pediatric Cardiology, Pediatric Pneumology, Neonatology and Emergency.
- Hospital Dr. Reynaldo Almanzar: Perinatology.

This rotation includes 8 hour shifts on weekdays and 12 hour shifts on weekends at the Hospital Infantil Dr. Robert Reid Cabral and 24 hour shifts at Hospital General Dr. Marcelino Vélez Santana and Ciudad Sanitaria Hospital Dr. Luis E. Aybar.

### Psychiatry Clerkship

Credits: 6

Location: Hospital Dr. Francisco Moscoso Puello

In this 6 week clerkship, students rotate through:

- Outpatient clinic.
- Inpatient ward.
- Patient crisis unit

Being in contact with a psychiatric patient can prove to be a challenging task. This allows students to learn how to handle patients in the different stages of treatment: From inpatient treatment, day to day follow up consultations and help groups. This rotation does not include afternoon or night shifts.

### Gynecology and Obstetrics Surgery

Credits: 10

Location: Hospital Dr. Reynaldo Almanzar, Hospital General Dr. Marcelino Vélez Santana, and Hospital Maternidad Nuestra Señora de La Altagracia

This 9 week clerkship is divided in several rotations through different obstetrics and gynecology subspecialties departments:

- Normal and pathological pregnancy
- High risk pregnancies
- Labor
- Postpartum
- Cervical clinic
- Sonography
- Emergency

During this clerkship the students are required to form a very active part of the obstetrics and gynecology department. They participate in prenatal checkups, delivery of babies, assisting residents during c-sections and perform gynecologic procedures like pap smears, pelvic examination and a rotation in the department of cervical pathology. This rotation includes 24 hour shift.

## Health Sciences Area Code of Conduct

- 1) To preserve your health and that of your peers, you must follow the rules and instructions of your guides.
- 2) The Health Sciences Area is not responsible for the items, furniture, clothes, belongings of others, public or private property that is broken, wasted or used and that must be replaced in monetary value. The student is responsible and is obliged to pay or answer for it.
- 3) The Health Sciences Area is not responsible for items lost or forgotten in hospitals or in any facility where classes or activities are held.
- 4) The Health Sciences Area is not responsible for the acts or facts that you do.
- 5) The Health Sciences Area is not responsible for medical expenses, if the cause of the condition is negligence by the student affected; however, we provide first aid.
- 6) In case of any prescription medication, the student is responsible for carrying it.
- 7) Two tardy are considered an absence.
- 8) The use of the badge is mandatory in all rotations.
- 9) The attendance to less than 80% of the class or rotation will lead to a failed grade in the course or clerkship (Art. 51, Academic Regulations). The laboratories and shifts must be replaced in case of absence. The reason for the absence must be notified.
- 10) Students must have their vaccinations up to date, mainly of the following: Tuberculosis, Hepatitis B, Tetanus and Diphtheria (Td / Tdap), Varicella, Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR). Free vaccines are available in the Primary Care Unit Dr. Evangelina Rodriguez.

### *On practices in the hospital:*

- 11) The Health Sciences Area is not responsible for items lost or forgotten in hospitals or in any facility where classes or activities are held.
- 12) Clinical practice schedule during the clerkship is usually from 7am to 2pm Monday to Friday, but this may vary depending on the clerkship.
- 13) Depending on the rotation, the shifts may be 12 to 24 hours, Monday to Sunday, according to the rotation group to which you are assigned to.
- 14) Avoid performing techniques or procedures for which you do not have the skills or for those you do not have the resources necessary in the institution to carry them out.
- 15) A long-sleeved white coat should be used in clinical practice.
- 16) Students should dress in a professional and clean manner. Shorts, sandals and hats are not allowed during clinical practice hours. Scrubs can be worn during the day and during shift. Comfortable and closed shoes are recommended.
- 17) It is not allowed to go to the INTEC campus in scrubs.

### *On the doctor-patient relationship:*

- 18) You will defend the life, health, dignity and interests of your patients, denying any unnecessary or unauthorized treatment or maneuver, in which case you shall inform your superiors.
- 19) You will inform the patient or their relatives truthful and timely information on the diagnosis, treatment and prognosis relevant or possible. The information shall be in moderation, prudence and warmth, respect for human dignity.
- 20) You will write the clinical record of each patient in print. The record must be complete, neat, legible, accurate, and logically sequenced, as established by the rules.

### Places of Interest near INTEC

Nearby the campus, you can find the National Botanical Gardens Dr. Rafael Ma. Moscoso, which is a protected area devoted to contemplation and study of nature and for recreation of the people of the city. There are also many diners around the campus. Recommended places are:

- Cafeteria Margarita.
- Helados Bon.
- FoodCourt INTEC

There is also a supermarket called La Cadena in front of the school campus, but be careful crossing the avenue because it is a busy street and cars can pass at high speeds.

Nearby the Campus neighborhood you can find many malls and restaurants:

- Pizzarelli - Los Próceres Avenue.
- Diamond Mall - Los Próceres Avenue
- Ágora Mall - John F. Kennedy Avenue

*\*\*Warning about eating in the Dominican Republic: We have a wide variety of food available in the Santo Domingo area, with delivery. Also, many street vendors that will sell anything from food to shoes and toys. Beware of food vendors, because these may not follow any sanitary rules and may be contaminated. This also applies to food in and around the hospital you're in. Ask a peer beforehand. Even if the food look tasty.*

## How to get to INTEC

### Travel and Transportation Services

- By Airport:

There are 4 main airports in the Dominican Republic: International Airport of the Americas José Francisco Peña Gómez, Punta Cana International Airport, Gregorio Luperón International Airport (better known as the International Airport of Puerto Plata), International Airport of La Romana and International Airport of the Cibao.

The best choice for arrival to the country, is the International Airport of the Americas José Francisco Peña Gómez because it's the closest to the city of Santo Domingo and therefore INTEC. From there, it is advised to take a taxi to your destination or to the university. You can arrange in advance with the institution to get a recommend taxi company to leave the airport safely.

If you are coming from one of the other airports, bus services are available that can take you to Santo Domingo for a surcharge. If not, you can also take a taxi to take you to Santo Domingo or to the nearest the bus station in that city and from there take a bus to Santo Domingo. Upon arrival to the city, take a taxi to your destination or university.

- By Bus:

### Office of Metropolitan Bus Service (OMSA)

This is a government public bus service for passenger transport. It is the most economic form of transportation in the city, taking a distance of up to 33 km with set stops. For a detailed map of the bus service line, please check the Oficina Metropolitana de Servicios de Autobuses (OMSA) website at [www.omsa.gob.do](http://www.omsa.gob.do). Bus service fee is: RD\$15.00 – 20.00.

Near INTEC there is a bus stop for the Los Rios Route. It is located in front of the small park at the right side of the campus. This stop is protected by a paid security service of the INTEC University. This route map is available on the website.

### Federation of Transport the New Option (FENATRANO) Public Transportation Service

This is a nongovernment, syndicated public bus, and car and motorcycle transport service. The buses are commonly called "Guaguas" or "Voladoras", car called "Conchos" and motorcycle are called "Motoconchos". These buses, cars and motorcycles start and stops in different points in where they hope to have a sufficient number of passengers to leave. These are generally smaller bus. We know what is the route to which is directed because a collector shouts from the door to ask if people will get on and is often called "pitcher." You can make a hand signal to board the bus extending a hand to the face and pointing a finger down. There are no stops assigned, so the way to stopping is to inform the collector who shall inform the driver to stop the march or to shout stop (in Spanish "parada").



They are more expensive than OMSA buses, but much less than regular and ordered taxi service. The approximate cost is RD \$ 20.00 to 30.00, but varies according to distance of travel.

Although they are not common in the capital as the rest of the country, "motoconchos" offer a private transport service from one assigned point to another. There are plans to suspend this type of transport due to its high level of danger, but still common in most part of the city.

At the beginning of the Crisantemos Street, behind the INTEC Campus, there is a stop for both "Motoconchos" and "Guaguas". The bus route is number 37, which goes north and south in these streets:

- Winston Churchill Avenue.
- Fountain blue Gardens Street.
- Los Rios.

By Metro:

#### Metro System of Santo Domingo

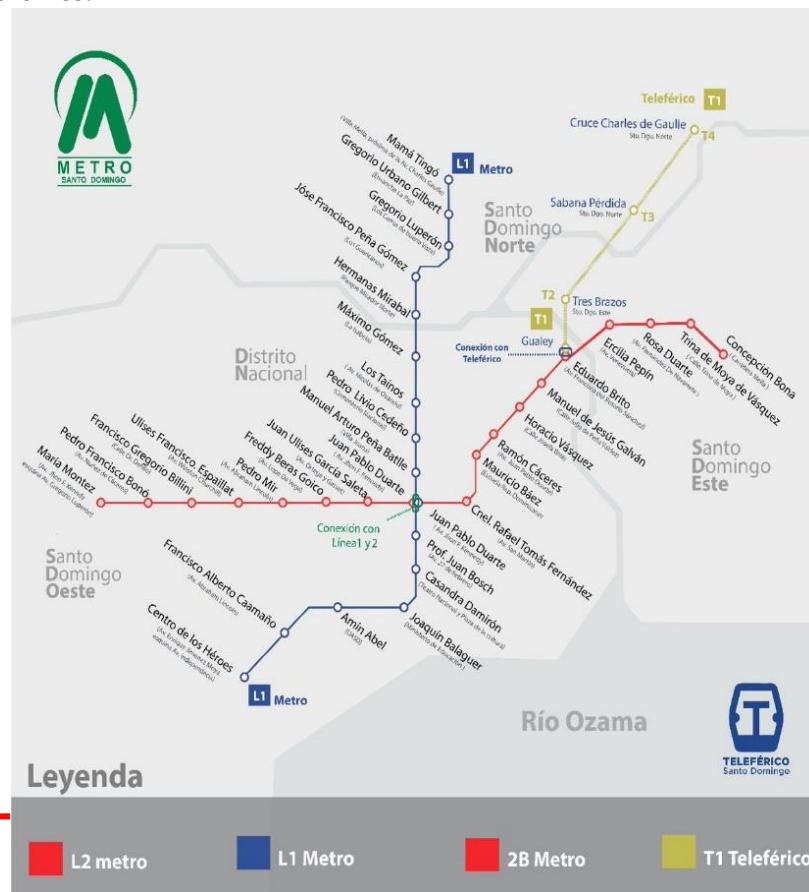
This is a government public road transportation system, or Metro, which serves the city of Santo Domingo, with a North-South line, consists of 16 stations in one line or Line 1 (blue color) and 18 stations in other line or Line 2 (red color). Metro is the cost of RD \$ 20.00 per trip, but prices may vary. Line 2 is the one near to INTEC.
